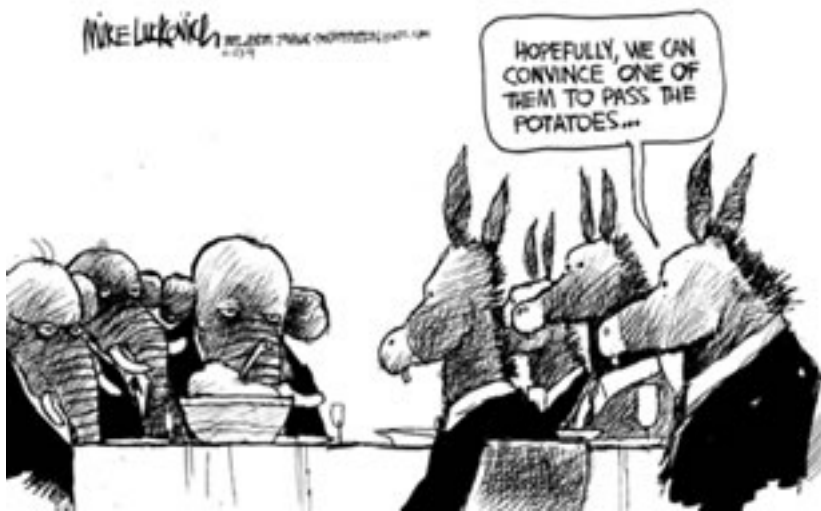
This is important to highlight because, over the last several decades, Black people have voted for Democratic candidates 94% of the time in critical federal and state elections.
